DELTA NATURALISTS MONTHLY MEETING

January 5, 2016

Welcome: Tom introduced members of the Exec. and Directors. There were two visitors this evening: Jenny Hards and Graham Sunderland.

Minutes: Rob McGregor moved that the Minutes of the December 1, 2015 meeting be approved; Carol Rennie seconded. The motion was carried. Tom also pointed out the December newsletter and all agreed that it was excellent.

Mail: Jim Kneesch informed us that four membership cheques have been received since the last meeting.

Treasurer & Membership: Jim Kneesch indicated that the number of memberships effective December 31, 2015 was 75. Of these 49 are individual members; 26 are family. Since then, another four or five new members have joined our ranks.

Membership cards were handed out to those members present. Members may be eligible to receive discounts on bird seed at the Tsawwassen Wild Bird Centre.

Our bank balance effective 31 December 2015 was \$5816.27. The fund for the new scope is now up to \$1600+. Due to the current currency differences between the Canadian and U.S. dollar, the cost for a new scope has increased substantially. Donations are tax deductible.

Newsletter: Audrey, as always, encouraged members to submit articles. This past newsletter included wonderful pictures of birds taken by some of our members.

Publicity: Valerie reported that all is well. Our p.r. seems to be drawing in visitors.

Social: Elizabeth Perrin/LizStewart/AudreyCoutts/Joanne Williamson: Elizabeth reported that the sign-up sheets for January to March goodies have vanished. These will be recirculated. Tom thanked those who had brought goodies. He

subsequently thanked Joanne van Snellenberg by e-mail for her delicious cookies.

Environment Issues: Nicki Brockamp reported on the Birds and Biodiversity Committee news. Delta Council had agreed that Delta needs a Birds and Biodiversity Strategy and have designated staff to work on this. Nicki indicated that the Delta Nats. subcommittee wants to stay involved, by working with the Delta staff.

Anita reported on the public information session concerning WESPAC's proposal to build a jetty to enable transport of LNG. B.C. Gas is expanding its capacity to convert natural gas to LNG, and WESPAC clearly wants to "cash in" on this expansion. There were two sessions: one in North Delta and one in Ladner. The meetings were hosted by Dr. Eoin Finn and Kevin Washbrook of Voters Taking Action on Climate Change.
